



“Decorative Arts” Suggested Itinerary

There are many things to see at Historic Deerfield. We suggest the following experiences...

SELF GUIDED SPACES you can visit on your own, at your own pace:

- The Flynt Center of Early New England Life has open-storage of our permanent collection in the *Museum’s Attic*, and two galleries currently featuring exhibitions of our textile and furniture collections. Open 9:30 a.m.-4 p.m.
- The Stebbins House was the first brick house built in Deerfield in 1799 by Asa Stebbins. The house showcases decorative arts in the neoclassical style popular in that period. Open 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m.
- The Apprentice’s Workshop at Dwight House shows how goods were made by hand. Includes hands-on learning. Open daily 12-4 p.m.

GUIDED HOUSE TOURS available on the hour from 10 a.m.-4 p.m.:

- The Ashley House was built for the Reverend Jonathan Ashley, the town’s second minister, in the 1730s. Historic Deerfield founders Henry and Helen Geier Flynt restored the building in 1948, and furnished it with 18th-century decorative arts owned by the *River Gods* – the Connecticut River Valley elite. *Visitors should arrive five minutes before the start of hourly tours. Tours last approximately 35 minutes.*

TOURS MADE BY APPOINTMENT when you purchase your ticket:

- The Allen House was the Deerfield home of founders Henry and Helen Geier Flynt. The house is furnished with their own collections, as they lived in the 1950s and 1960s. *See a museum attendant where you bought your ticket for more information. Subject to availability.*
- Silver and Metalware Collection houses our collection of American silver, dating from the late 17th century through the early 19th century. *See a museum attendant where you bought your ticket for more information. Subject to availability.*

Museum Store Hours: open 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. daily

Champney’s Tavern at the Deerfield Inn Hours: open 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. for beverages and snacks; lunch served 12-2:30 p.m.
