




Highlights of the Season

Invisible Makers: Textiles, Dress, and Marginalized People in 18th- and 19th-Century America

An Historic Deerfield Virtual Forum
April 10, 9:15 a.m.–4:45 p.m. EDT
Join us for a virtual forum of lectures from a dynamic roster of academic and museum professionals discussing examples of the important roles and contributions of BIPOC textile and clothing producers and consumers in the 18th and 19th centuries.

Presented as case studies, the research includes textiles and clothing produced by forced labor within plantations; people of



color working as tailors and dressmakers in Massachusetts; and marginalized people who fashioned their dressed bodies using Anglo-European garments in ways that both subverted normative styles while expressing "other" cultural identities. This program will be presented live via Zoom webinar. The link to the webinar will be sent to registrants prior to the event. Recordings will be available to registrants for a period of two weeks after each session. The cost for the webinar is \$60 (\$50 for members), \$85 for new members and \$45 for students. 
Deerfield-Wellesley Symposium

From Suffrage to Stonewall: The Visual and Material Culture of Social Justice

These campaigns sought political, social, economic, and cultural change and deployed visual and material culture to advance their goals. The 2021 Deerfield-Wellesley Symposium will focus on research related to the wide range of artistic expression generated by social justice movements, from painting, sculpture, public performance and installation to ephemera, costume, and craft. Digging Deeper: Stebbins House Archaeology Project

May 29, June 11-13, 25-27

Historic Deerfield continues its archaeological investigation of the Stebbins House site. Museum visitors are invited to visit the excavation and talk to archaeologists at work as the follow up on clues from a ground-penetrating radar survey.

Artifacts unearthed at the Stebbins House site will be processed at a field lab table for visitors to see. Visitors can view artifacts and ask questions about what they might reveal about daily life at the site more than 175 years ago.

Summer Lecture Series: Celebrating 50 Years of Scholarship, Research, and Discovery at the Memorial Libraries

The 2021 summer lecture series celebrates the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Memorial Libraries by Historic Deerfield and the Pocumtuck Valley Memorial Association. The depth and breadth of the joint Library's remarkable holdings attract scholars and researchers from the region and around the world. Come and learn what three scholars found at the Memorial Libraries as they explore daily life in the colonial period, colonial ecology in an Atlantic economy, and the material culture of early American education.

Building in the Picturesque: Domestic Architecture in the Age of Industry, 1840–1870

July 10, 9 a.m.-3 p.m. EDT, Registration and fee required. Virtual Program.

Shifting tastes in design and emerging architectural styles brought on by the Romantic

Movement had a profound impact on American domestic architecture in the midnineteenth century. Changes in aesthetic ideas, coupled with the fruits of the Industrial Revolution, radically transformed the design and construction of dwellings, allowing picturesque architecture to express people's individuality and domestic lifestyle. Historic Deerfield's seventh annual symposium on early New England architecture will focus on cottage and villa architecture, exploring design theory of the time, advances in building technology, developments in domestic conveniences and related topics that initiated and fueled this phase of American architecture.

Broom-Making Demonstrations at the History Workshop

Brooms were so important to the economy of 19th-century Deerfield that at one time there were eight broom-making shops along the Street! Join us in the History Workshop to watch a broom being made by hand, learn about growing and processing broomcorn, and see broom making tools and equipment.

Learn the story of Caleb Salisbury, an African-American man who lived in Deerfield and made brooms, and learn about the role of broommaking and craft industry in the 19th century.

Three Sisters Garden


The Cooks' Garden

This kitchen garden serves as a source of fresh ingredients for the museum's open hearth cooking demonstrations and classes. The garden contains an assortment of useful plants commonly found in New England during the 18th and early 19th centuries.

Channing Blake Footpath

The Channing Blake Footpath takes visitors past a working farm and through meadows to the Deerfield River. Interpretive panels along the one-third mile walk describe local geology, natural history, and Native and European presence.

What's On View?

TEXTiles and Technology

Featured in the Helen Geier Flynt Textile Gallery in 2021 is an insightful display featuring a group of objects that used both the printed word and/or new innovations to decorate and improve life for people in the 19th and 20th centuries. The theme is explored through a selection of objects that include an engaging pair of printed cotton handkerchiefs, a rare pair of early 20th-century water wings, and a 19th-century hoop skirt patent—as well as an actual hoop skirt made to its specifications!

TEXTiles and Technology is but one of the themes explored in the gallery, named for founder Helen Geier Flynt (1895–1986), whose interest and collecting focus helped found the core of the museum's important fashion and textile collection, which today numbers some 8,000 pieces.



Boston Furniture Masterworks at Historic Deerfield

Come visit the "Into the Woods" gallery at the Flynt Center of Early New England Life to view an impressive array of furniture produced in Boston in the 18th and 19th centuries. Rare and exceptional forms include an 18th-century japanned high chest, an 18th-century turret-top tea table, and a 19th-century sideboard attributed to cabinetmakers John and Thomas Seymour.



Anti-Slavery Ceramics at Historic Deerfield

In 18th and 19th-century Britain and America, ceramics became an important medium for denouncing the horrors of slavery and promoting social change. Come visit the "Museum's Attic" at the Flynt Center of Early New England Life to view and learn more about examples of antislavery ceramics, and the meaning behind their design and decoration.

For now, Historic Deerfield is open to the public Fridays, Saturdays, Sundays, and Monday holidays, 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., May 29-November 28, 2021. Check our website for updates to our schedule.

Admission: \$15 for adults (18+) and FREE for children (under 18), members, and residents of Deerfield/South Deerfield. Admission includes walking tours, first floor tours of at least one historic house, the History Workshop, and the Flynt Center of Early New England Life. COVID-19 Safety Information: In accordance with CDC guidelines, the museum's public spaces are thoroughly cleaned and disinfected frequently. By order of the Governor of Massachusetts, visitors are required to social distance and wear a mask or face covering. Access to historic houses may be limited due to COVID-19. Accessibility: Wheelchairs (26") and assistive listening devices are available at the Visitor Center at Hall Tavern. The first floors of several Historic Deerfield museum houses, the Memorial Libraries, the Flynt Center of Early New England Life, the Deerfield Community Center, the Deerfield Inn and the Museum Gift Shop and Bookstore are accessible to those using standard-size 26-inch wheelchairs.
