Help bring Deerfield objects home!



Indian Pudding

A colonial treat from the Deerfield Inn. Serves 6-8 people.

- 1 quart of milk
- 1 bag of cornmeal mix
- 2/3 cup molasses
- 1/3 cup maple syrup
- 1 ounce butter
- 4 eggs


Heat milk in a double boiler until skin forms. Whisk in cornmeal mix. Cook until thickened, stirring occasionally. Add molasses and maple syrup and heat thoroughly. In a separate bowl beat the eggs. Whisk in a small amount of the hot mixture into the eggs. Now mix the egg into the remaining hot mixture. Pour into a dish for baking. Bake at 350° in a water bath until set (1½-2 hours).

Discover the Art of Quilling This Spring

Historic Deerfield's History Workshop, an interactive space for hands-on learning of colonial history, will showcase the art of quillwork this spring. Quillwork is the art of curling small strips of paper into intricate coiled designs. An ancient art form first seen as metal filigree used to decorate Greek, Egyptian, and Etruscan tombs, many centuries later paper filigree became popular in Europe as an art form used in making framed coats of arms, portraits, and decorative shadow boxes. In colonial America coiling decorative paper was called "quillwork" because the shaft of a goose feather or "quill" was used as the tool to roll strips of paper.

During weekends in May and June, you can stop by and learn how to quill yourself! After you master this lovely craft, stop by the Museum Gift Shop and Bookstore to discover the quillwork cards for sale and perhaps pick up your own quillwork kit to continue the craft after you've left Historic Deerfield.

Historic Deerfield Receives Important Gifts of Porter Family Materials Giving First-Hand Account of American Revolution

Historic Deerfield's Memorial Libraries recently received the gifts of important materials from the years of the Revolutionary War from Samuel and David Cooley, relating to their family, the Porters of Hadley, Massachusetts. The papers come from two brothers, Eleazar Porter (1728–1797) and Elisha Porter (1742–1796).


These important papers were kept in private hands, descending through the family, until now. Elisha's papers provide an intimate view of the Revolution from an officer just outside the limelight who had a front row seat to history. Elisha Porter's

papers contain important letters, including a February 10, 1776, letter signed by General George Washington at Cambridge instructing Colonel Porter to move his regiment north to Canada via Fort Number Four and Onion River in relief of Montgomery/Arnold's failed expeditions. There are also letters signed by general officers Philip Schuyler, Baron de Woedtke, David Wooster. Timothy Danielson, and a dispatch with the signature of Benedict Arnold. Porter's 1781 commission from the State of Massachusetts-Bay bears the bold signature of John Hancock. In addition, the materials include correspondence with local dignitaries, broadsides, muster rolls, and receipts regarding equipping troops.

Also included in this gift are rare parts of the uniform of Elisha Porter, including the epaulettes he had made in 1778. The receipt for the epaulettes is included in this collection.

Eleazar Porter's papers provide valuable insight into local court proceedings in pre-Revolutionary Hadley. The papers include writs, orders, summonses, and receipts for various cases heard before him as a judge.

These papers are a fascinating resource for any scholar of the Revolution, as well as local historians. Historic Deerfield plans to have these materials on view in the future. At this time, they can be accessed by researchers in the Memorial Libraries.
