

### Inspired Design: Asian Decorative Arts and Their Adaptations

Lobby, Flynt Center of  
Early New England Life  
Now on view through  
February 9, 2020



By the 17th century, English and European merchants purchased and traded quantities of luxury goods such as lacquerwares, porcelains, and textiles from cultures centered in Southeast Asia. Emerging New England elites also acquired these tangible examples of global sophistication and economic success to decorate their homes and adorn their bodies. These imports proved so popular that they could hardly satisfy the growing desire for new textiles, clothing forms, furniture, ceramics, and other decorative arts. To meet this increasing demand, enterprising English, European, and American manufacturers competed with

these global imports by producing more affordable versions of Asian design and decorative elements.

*Inspired Design: Asian Decorative Arts and Their Adaptations* highlights 18th- and 19th-century Asian decorative arts and their imitations, drawn from the museum's rich collection. The exhibition explores how Western craftsmen adapted Asian decorative arts into a design vocabulary more familiar to them and their customers, and highlights New Englanders' own quest for these imported goods.

## Pounded Cheese (Homemade Cheese Spread)

This is a great recipe for a quick and tasty cheese to spread on crackers or toast points. It comes from an early 19th-century cookbook, *The Cook's Oracle*. The recipe is a favorite in our Open Hearth Cooking program. Many people are surprised to find curry powder and cayenne pepper in the recipe because of the common myth that cooks used spices in the past to cover up the taste of food that had “gone by.” In reality, like today, people like a little flavor and spice in their food. We encourage you to try this tasty recipe from the past!

### Modern Adaptation

#### Ingredients:

- 2 cups room temperature grated cheddar cheese
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 teaspoons mustard
- ¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper

1 teaspoon curry powder  
1 tablespoon sherry



Mix all ingredients together in a food processor or mixer. Mix it until you get a spreadable

consistency. Taste the spread and correct the seasoning. For a good workout and a more “historical” experience, combine all ingredients in a sturdy bowl, and then pound the cheese with a mortar until smooth. Serve with crackers or toast points.

Historic Deerfield recently acquired an important piece at auction—a very early, punch-decorated, pine box, inscribed “RD,” Deerfield, 1690–1710.

The “RD” box is a rare piece of furniture made in Deerfield within memory of English settlement. It was arguably owned in one of the houses at the southern end of The Street that survived the burning of town during the 1704 raid. As such, the box defines the furnishings available on the edge of empire during the first years of the English town.

We could not have acquired this important piece without the help of the Deerfield



Collectors Guild, which exists to support Historic Deerfield’s acquisition of significant objects of art, culture, and history made or owned in Old Deerfield from the 17th to the early 20th century. ## Two Generations of Historic Deerfield Membership

When asked when she first came to know about Historic Deerfield, Gertude (Trudy) Ralph answers, “Always! It’s in my blood!” Trudy’s mother was born in 1913 in Deerfield and always had strong and deep connections here, attending the White Church (now the Deerfield Community Center) and volunteering for PVMA and Historic Deerfield. Trudy herself became a member of Historic Deerfield in 1988 and began volunteering when Historic Deerfield launched the Ambassadors (Volunteer) Program five years ago.

Alicia Ralph, who is Trudy’s niece, first visited Deerfield as a child with her aunt. Collectively and individually, Deerfield has been a community center to both women.

“It’s such a special place—the kind of place that just doesn’t exist anywhere else,” says Trudy. She comes as often as she can and particularly loves visiting throughout the different seasons.

“I love all the pumpkins and chrysanthemums in the fall and the handmade wreaths at Christmas time,” Trudy said. Trudy and Alicia volunteer at the close of the autumn season and hand out cookies and cider at holiday events. Trudy also makes a point to bring family and friends to Deerfield.

Deerfield is also Trudy and Alicia’s favorite place to meet up. The pair have been very close since Alicia was a child. They love the free lecture series offered in both the summer and winter by Historic

Deerfield, and sign up to volunteer at these events so they can spend time together and enjoy the lectures. They also enjoy spending summer afternoons here, after volunteering or just visiting as members. They have their lunch (from the Historic Deerfield food truck, The Lunch Box, of course, which Trudy says has the best hamburgers and Alicia says has the best sauerkraut!) at the picnic tables and enjoy each other’s company and the beauty of Deerfield.

Both women love Deerfield as a whole and the ambiance of the village. Trudy calls it, “a feel good place.” Alicia has a particular fondness for the textile collection and loves any programs or lectures that textile curator Ned Lazaro gives. She is also partial to Hadley chests, but adds, “I love the whole Street.”

When asked what they describe as the best reason for becoming members of Historic Deerfield, Alicia talks about the variety of activities and volunteer opportunities. “There are so many opportunities for people to get involved in different things, whether researching and archiving, sewing, or greeting people at events,” Alicia says. Trudy points to being able to come when she wants and concentrate on one house or one aspect of Historic Deerfield without having to rush through and see it all in a day. “As a member you don’t have to do it all at once, you can take your time,” Trudy says.

Finally, the women talk about how many friends they have made through their membership and volunteerism at Historic Deerfield. Trudy even met her dear, late companion, Bob Plaisted, at Historic Deerfield. These two women have great love for each other, for Historic Deerfield, and for the community of friends they have met here as members and volunteers.

## GET TO KNOW THE STAFF

### Heather Harrington

Heather Harrington is the Associate Librarian at the Memorial Libraries. She has been working at Historic Deerfield for eleven years. When asked about what she loves most about Historic Deerfield, Heather says it is its commitment to preserving the history of the town of Deerfield. As she explains, the history of many small towns are not widely known, except perhaps by a small number of residents, but the history of Deerfield is well-documented because of the work of Historic Deerfield.

Heather enjoys working with the public to answer their genealogical questions and to help them find the ancestral information they seek. She meets many people in her role and finds it so gratifying to see their genuine happiness when she is able to tell them where their ancestor lived, what their occupation was, or show them a sample of their ancestor's handwriting.

The Memorial Libraries are special in that there are two separate and unique libraries in one building. The Historic Deerfield Library has an excellent collection of books relating to local history, decorative



arts, and resources such as microfilm and databases that are not available at a local public library. The Pocumtuck Valley Memorial Association (PVMA) Library has a vast collection of family papers and documents relating to Deerfield residents. The two collections together provide a rich combination of resources.

The experience that Heather most often recommends to visitors and members is one of the walking tours. Whether the theme is the Old Burying Ground, the Pocumtuck Native Homeland, the Deerfield English Settlement, or the 1704 Deerfield Raid, each provides insight into the history of the town and allows visitors to experience Deerfield at their own pace and through the lens of one particular theme.

When Heather is not working, she loves to read and to research her own family genealogy. She has discovered a distant connection to Deerfield as she is descended from Hannah Beamon's brother-in-law. As we are fond of saying, "all roads lead to Deerfield!"
