



#### Ashley House

Built 1734 with alterations, home of Deerfield's second minister with furnishings of the Connecticut River Valley elite.



#### Sheldon House

Built 1755, self-guided tour, furnishings reflect the life of a farming family.



#### Moors House

1848, restoration-in-progress.



#### Deerfield Inn

1884, full-service inn with 24 guest rooms, Champney's Restaurant & Tavern for lunch and fine dining.



#### Museum Gift Shop and Bookstore

Gifts, books, needlecraft, museum reproductions, furniture, postcards, cafe' and candy.



#### Apprentice's Workshop at Dwight House

1750s, moved from Springfield, Mass. A hands-on activity center featuring architectural woodworking, factory-made English ceramics, and woven wool textiles.



#### Flynt Center of Early New England Life

Special exhibitions, Helen Geier Flynt Textile Gallery, The Museum's Attic, and Powder Horn Collection.

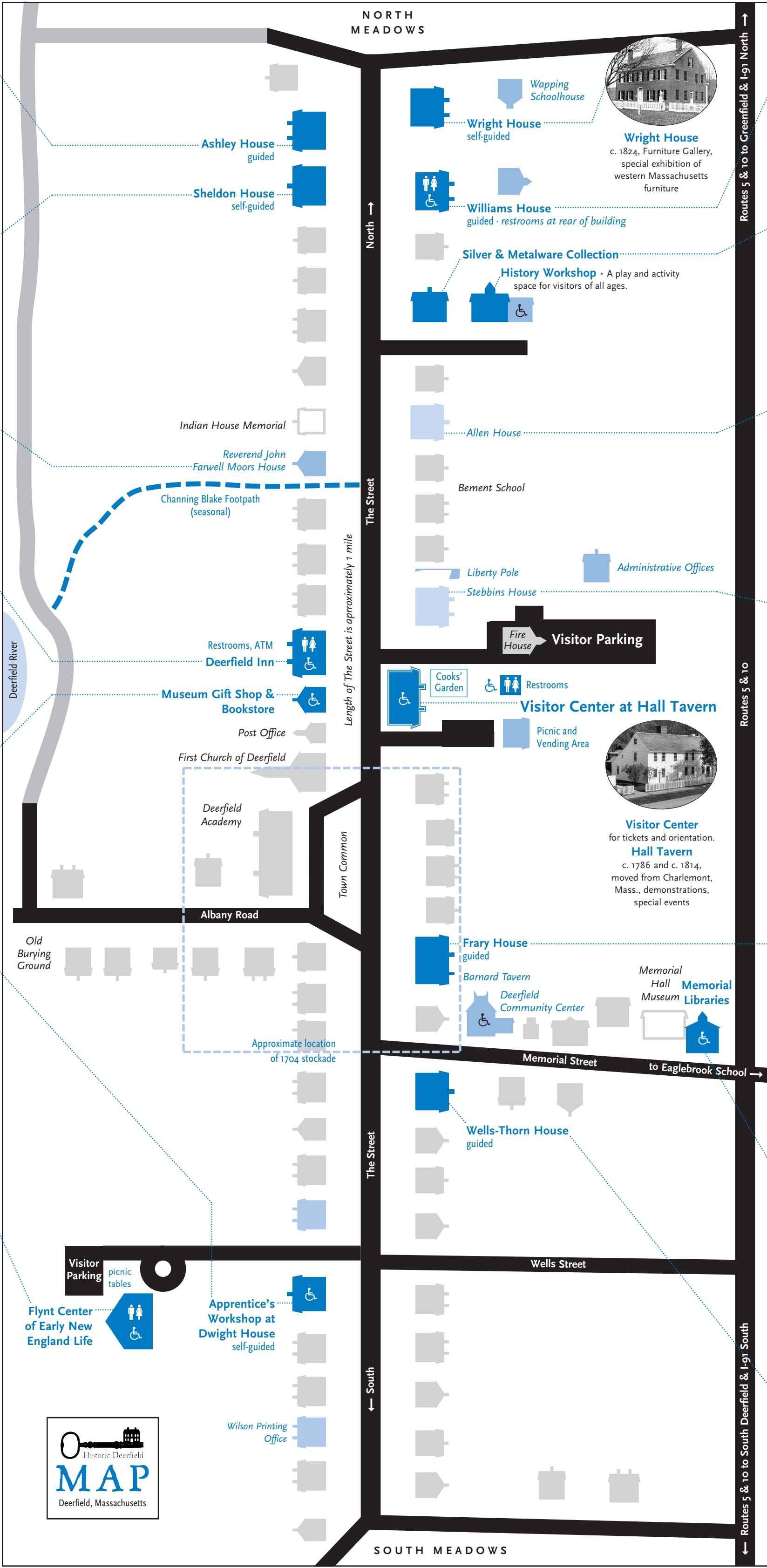
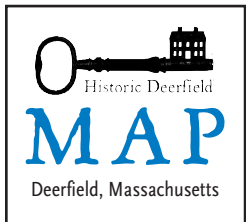

#### Williams House

Remodeled 1817, household of prosperous village residents.

#### Stebbins House

1799, self-guided tour Federal period architecture and furnishings.



#### Cooks' Garden

A traditional herb garden with many heirloom plants.



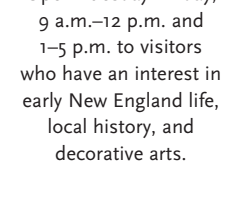
#### Frary House

c. 1760, Colonial Revival home of preservationist Charlotte Alice Baker, restored in the 1890s, with New England antiques, Arts and Crafts needlework, ironware, and basketry.



#### Barnard Tavern

1795, restoration-in-progress.

Open Tuesday–Friday, 9 a.m.–12 p.m. and 1–5 p.m. to visitors who have an interest in early New England life, local history, and decorative arts.

**A Brief History of Deerfield**

Deerfield is a place of continuity. The meadows surrounding the village, tilled for generations by Native Americans, are still planted by Deerfield farmers. The 17th-century English town plan of a compact village and broad meadows is still visible on the landscape and defines the village. Today, 18th- and 19th-century houses filled with antique furnishings reveal the lifestyles of Deerfield residents from the time of the first English settlement in 1669 to the Arts and Crafts Movement of the early 20th century.

**Picnicking:** In good weather, picnic tables are available for use at several museum houses and near the Visitor Center at Hall Tavern. An unheated, covered picnic area is also available outside the visitor center. Please use the trash barrels provided. Food and drink are not allowed in the museum buildings.

**Lost and found** is located in the Visitor Center at Hall Tavern and at the Flynt Center of Early New England Life. After hours visit the Deerfield Inn for lost and found items.

**Children:** Visit the History Workshop for children's activities including colonial dress-up clothes and period games. Please leave baby strollers and back carriers outside museum houses. Unaccompanied children may not enter museum buildings.

**Photography, video/audio taping, sketching, use of computer equipment, cellular telephones, and food and drink are not permitted inside any museum buildings. There is no smoking in all buildings, the Gift Shop and the Deerfield Inn. Umbrellas, strollers, water bottles, beverages and backpacks should be left outside of museum buildings. Thank you for your cooperation.**

**Pets** are welcome on leashes outdoors in the village, but not on the Channing Blake Footpath because of its proximity to farm animals. No pets are allowed in any museum building, except licensed assistance dogs. Please clean up after your pets.

## Tours and Programs

Some museum houses are shown on **guided tours**. Some museum houses are open all day for **self-guided tours**, while others are available by appointment.

A free **welcome film** is shown throughout the day in the Visitor Center at Hall Tavern.

Your **general admission ticket** includes any special programs scheduled during your visit, as well as a guided walking tour of the village during good weather. Walks begin from the Visitor Center at Hall Tavern.



## Visitor Information

**Hours:** Historic Deerfield is open daily from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. during the Regular Season. Please call 413-775-7214 for winter hours. [www.historic-deerfield.org](http://www.historic-deerfield.org).

**Parking** is located behind the firehouse with designated spaces for handicapped parking, recreational vehicles and tour buses, and is also available at the Flynt Center of Early New England Life.

**Restrooms** with accessible facilities are located behind the Visitor Center at Hall Tavern, at the Flynt Center of Early New England Life, at the Deerfield Inn, and behind the Williams House.

**ATM** is located at the Deerfield Inn.

**All Smoking** is prohibited in all Historic Deerfield buildings, the Museum Gift Shop & Bookstore, and the Deerfield Inn.

**Accessibility:** Wheelchair access in historic houses that are designated first floor accessible require wheelchairs with a maximum width of 26". Interior doorways of historic houses may limit mobility. Wheelchairs (26") are available for use at the Visitor Center at Hall Tavern. A rollator and wheelchair are available for use at the Flynt Center of Early New England Life. Standard size wheelchairs can be used at all other accessible locations, which include the Memorial Libraries, the Flynt Center of Early New England Life, the Deerfield Community Center, the Deerfield Inn, and the Museum Store. Assistive listening devices are available for use on guided tours. For more information, please call 413-775-7214.
