



Ashley House

Built 1734 with alterations, home of Deerfield's second minister with furnishings of the Connecticut River Valley elite.



Sheldon House

Built 1755; furnishings reflect the life of a farming family.



Moors House

1848, restoration in progress.



Deerfield Inn

1884, full-service inn with 24 guest rooms, Champney's Restaurant & Tavern for breakfast, lunch, and dinner.



Museum Gift Shop and Bookstore

Gifts, books, housewares, postcards and snacks.



Apprentice's Workshop at Dwight House

1750s, moved from Springfield, Mass. A hands-on activity center featuring architectural woodworking, factory-made English ceramics, and textiles.



Flynt Center of Early New England Life

Explore the exhibitions in our state-of-the-art facility with climate-controlled galleries, and visible storage of the museum collections.



Wilson Printing Office

Letter-press printing exhibitions with demonstrations in this early 19th century printing office.




Williams House

Built in 1730 and remodeled 1817, household of prosperous village residents.



Silver & Metalware Collection

c. 1814, a gallery of antique silver & metalware.



Allen House

1734, home of Henry and Helen Flynt, founders of Historic Deerfield. Furnished with their collection of American decorative arts.



Stebbins House

1799, restoration in progress. Building archaeology exhibit.




Cooks' Garden

A traditional herb garden with many heirloom plants.



Frary House

c. 1760, Colonial Revival home of preservationist Charlotte Alice Baker, restored in the 1890s, with New England antiques, Arts and Crafts needlework, ironware, and basketry.



Barnard Tavern

Built in 1795, the Tavern was at the center of village life at the end of the 18th century.



Memorial Libraries

Open Tuesday–Friday and first Saturdays, 9 a.m.–12 p.m. and 1–5 p.m., to visitors who have an interest in early New England life, local history, and decorative arts.



Wells-Thorn House

1747, interior furnishings illustrate change through time, 1725 to 1850. Home of Lucy Terry Prince, first known African-American poet.
