A Legacy of Excellence

The Historic Deerfield Summer Fellowship Program is a remarkable, immersive educational experience for college undergraduates. Ever since Helen and Henry Flynt established the program in 1956, with Peter Spang joining them a few years later, it has stood as the pre-eminent program of its kind for college undergraduates, providing an unparalleled journey into early American history and material culture.



An Unmatched Learning Environment

Students experience the unique setting of Deerfield, where the town itself becomes a living classroom. From the expansive museum and historic buildings to the picturesque fields and ridgelines, participants delve into history at every turn. Whether exploring the historic houses or visiting important sites and museums around New England and beyond, the program offers a comprehensive and deeply personal understanding of America's past.

Rigorous and Immersive Experience

The nine-week program is rigorous — equivalent to a semester's worth of learning packed into a summer! Participants engage in hands-on training across all museum departments: interpretation, archives, curatorial, preservation, development, and education. They work with extraordinary collections and outstanding mentors, conduct meticulous research, and contribute to rich documentation.

Fostering Intellectual Exchange and Community

Students experience the fertile exchange of ideas with Fellows from diverse backgrounds, passionate staff members, and visiting scholars. This collaborative environment not only broadens their perspectives but also forges lasting connections and friendships. More than 450 program alumni are now valued members of the Historic Deerfield family.

An Outsized Impact on Careers and Beyond

The program has had a powerful impact, with many graduates making their marks as curators, conservators, educators, preservationists, fundraisers, and directors. The program has also impacted fields in the worlds of academia and the marketplace in art and antiques, not to mention design, law, writing—and much, much more. Whether students enter these professions or choose a different path, the program equips them with essential tools that hone analytical and critical thinking and empowers them to personally contribute to the cultural fabric of America. However, financial fluctuations have at times limited the program's reach, affecting the number of fellows, the scope of field trips, and the amount of additional financial aid. Currently the program is largely covered by Historic Deerfield's operating budget and must compete against other institutional priorities.
